

### REPORT FROM THE INTERNATIONAL OFFICE - 2008 ACTIVITIES

The year 2008 brought further commitment to an enhanced future for IPPS as a unique, international presence in the world of ornamental horticulture. At its International Board Meeting in New Zealand in May, the Officers and International Directors approved the following as the new mission statement for IPPS:

"The mission of IPPS, with a focus on the global community of those involved in horticultural plant production, is to share knowledge, information, and skills; to provide guidance and support for lifelong career achievements; to increase recognition of the profession; and to maximize the integration of research, education, and horticultural knowledge."

Of special significance was agreement to assume use of the acronym "IPPS" as the organization's name, with the tag line defining the group as "Sharing Plant Production Knowledge Globally." This bold move confirms the recognition that the scope of individuals who benefit from IPPS membership has broadened beyond the original group of propagators to those who are involved in all aspects of plant production, those who manage the production process; horticultural educators, researchers, and students; and plant breeders, explorers, collectors, and conservationists. Those who supply the horticultural industry with a wide range of products and supplies, as well as those whose in administrative roles within plant production facilities, and those in the retail, landscape, and landscape installation profession – all are part of the integration of plants in our worldwide society and have a place in IPPS. Approval of the newly designed IPPS logo with the tag line provides a new opportunity for positioning IPPS in the worldwide horticultural community.

News of the new logo and its implications were sent via news releases to known horticultural media in the USA and other countries, and regions were encouraged to share the news in their own areas as well. The traditional logo of the grafting hands, and the official name of the organization, will continue to be used in internal Society matters.

In an effort to attract those who have an interest in IPPS but who are not geographically within one of the established eight regions, the International Board established a new category of "at large" members from other locations in the world. In 2008, the first four individuals took advantage of this membership opportunity – from Korea, Barbados, The Netherlands, and the Philippines. They received Volume 57 of the Combined Proceedings as part of their membership and were invited to submit papers for Volume 58 in a specially designated section.

In preparation for future growth, the International Board developed and approved a number of procedures and financial review processes that will guide the development of IPPS as

new activities are considered. The continued work to mount all 58 volumes of Combined Proceedings on the PubHort website of the International Society for Horticultural Science (ISHS) appears to be on track for launch late in 2009.

Volume 57 of the Combined Proceedings was completed ahead of schedule and shipped in August to members. Volume 58 was begun in the fall of 2008 and also appears likely to be ready for publication ahead of schedule, in the summer of 2009.

#### **MEMBERSHIP**

Overall membership in IPPS dropped again slightly in 2008, with some regions showing an increase. An active Membership Committee of International directors and Alternate Directors worked diligently to develop ideas and tools to assist the regions in their recruitment and retention efforts.

#### HIGHLIGHTS OF THE 2008 INTERNATIONAL BOARD MEETING

On May 17 and 21, the International Board of Directors met in Raumati and also in Auckland, New Zealand, with Terry Hatch presiding at the meeting. All eight regions were represented.

#### Highlights of the meeting are as follows:

- Minutes of the October 2007 meeting were approved.
- Activities of the International Office were reviewed, including the reported levels of staff time needed to manage the IPPS international operations.
- Year-end membership for 2007 was recorded at 2,097 from all regions.
- Two new "at-large" members were acknowledged and agreement was made to have International Directors also email a welcome to them as they are confirmed for membership.
- Approval was given for the Intl. Office to provide metal plates with more description for the plaques given for five years of membership, sending these to the Regional Secretary-Treasurers for presentation at regional conferences. Regions may add metal plates in their own language, at their expense, if desired.
- Plans were reviewed for the 2009 International Tour in Ireland and the 2010 International Tour in Eastern United States. Dates and locations for all regional conferences will continue to be listed on the IPPS website.
- Discussion was held on ways in which to best utilize the time on the International Tour for more meetings of the International Board, allowing maximum time to address the business under consideration.

- Financial reports for the 2007 year-end and first quarter of 2008 were reviewed, reflecting the increased equity position of the Society. Investments were reported with 4.1% earnings in 2007.
- Reports from the various Regions, presented by their Directors, were presented and accepted.
- The International Editor presented reports regarding publication of Volume 57, anticipated to be ready for distribution in August, and anticipated costs for Volume 58 in 2009. Discussion was held about how to incorporate PowerPoint presentations in CD formats separately from the Proceedings.
- The Award of Honor recipient was selected for 2008 and for 2009, with a change in
  policy that provides for the region hosting the International Tour and Board meeting
  to submit a nominee from that region to receive this award, thereby rotating the
  award among all regions.
- A cost analysis of the actual cost to support the editorial preparation, production, and distribution of the *Combined Proceedings* in book and CD formats was reviewed for future discussion when establishing membership dues to the International Society.
- A number of financial policies and procedures were reviewed and approved, including
  agreement that the cost of editorial preparation of the *Proceedings* is a cost to all
  members; that earnings from IPPS investments can be used to offset expenses in a
  budget year if needed; that all projects and activities must have financial review for
  budget impact before Board consideration; and that major projects with future
  financial implications can be supported with funds set aside each year.
- Approval was given to purchase general liability and professional liability coverage for IPPS, with two quotes to be provided.
- Progress toward support for facilitating membership recruitment and retention activities by regions was reported, with the development of a "toolkit" of ideas that can be considered by all regions.
- There was agreement to suspend further consideration of an IPPS refereed journal, but to assist the *Propagation of Ornamental Plants* journal produced in cooperation with the Region of Great Britain & Ireland, with a link from the IPPS website to that publication's information.
- A report was reviewed on the progress toward mounting all of the past *Combined Proceedings* on the website of the Intl. Society for Horticultural Science's "PubHort" website IPPS member access to the site is anticipated for 2009.
- A policy was approved disallowing PowerPoints to be submitted for publishing in the Combined Proceedings in lieu of a written paper. Inclusion in a separate CD or on regional websites could be alternative ways to use for PowerPoint presentations.
- The Board approved the management contract for 2008 with The Heuser Group and also approved an increase in the Editor's fee for 2008 consistent with the USA's Consumer Price Index. The Board also agreed in principle to a contract with The Heuser Group for 2009, with the fee to be determined later in 2008.
- As part of a complete review of the Constitution and Bylaws, in preparation for a complete rewriting of this governance document to reflect current and future operations, the Board approved a revised mission statement to better reflect the purpose of IPPS now and into the future.
- A new graphic logo representing IPPS with just the letters as an acronym and a tag line reading "Sharing Plant Production Knowledge Globally" was approved for use in marketing the organization. A business card promoting the logo, tag line, and website was approved as a template to be used by regions to print and distribute as desired. Information and .pdf files will be sent to regions very quickly.

- An IPPS blog titled "IPPS Matters" was approved for continuation, with each region encouraged to identify a person to use the blog for reporting on their conference. The blog is accessible from the home page of the IPPS website.
- A policy was approved allowing companies to note support for IPPS through use of the logo and a statement of support, with only individuals allowed to indicate "membership" in IPPS
- The Board agreed to continue the development of guidelines to launch an IPPS
  Propagator Exchange program between regions with financial support from the
  International budget expectations are for applications to be submitted in the
  summer of 2009.
- Approval was given to selling the previous Combined Proceedings books to nonmembers at higher prices than members, to better utilize the inventory of this accumulated knowledge, and to promote purchase of back issues by libraries.
- Approval was given to send to all regions a supply of past Combined Proceedings on CD format to sell or give away to promote the Society and the information it "seeks and shares."
- A common screed for use by regions, accompanying the new gavels, was distributed.
- Approval was given for all Regional Secretary-Treasurers to meet on the 2013
   International Tour in the Western Region, with travel costs supported by the
   International budget and other costs supported by the regions or in other ways.
- Officers for 2009 were elected as follows: Peter Bingham (GB&I) as President;
   James Johnson (Eastern) as Vice President; and Greg McPhee (Australia) as Second Vice President.

# SUMMARY OF THE 2008 INTERNATIONAL TOUR, NEW ZEALAND May, 2008

Aotearoa, "The Long White Cloud" is the name given to New Zealand by the Maori people who first settled on these islands. At many places in this country, you feel you're in the clouds because of the magnificent volcanic mountain landscape. We were in good hands all the way with our tour hosts Grant Hayman and Ray Lawson, who also serve as the International Director and Alternate Director, respectively. We also had the benefit of planning assistance from Grant's wife, Robynne Hayman. Robynne is also a trained nurse, and was well-prepared to help with all the minor medical challenges -- she did a great job relieving the cold symptoms that traveled around the bus! We all appreciate how much work and planning goes into these tours, from the hosts to all the IPPS members who help out with various tasks ahead of, during, and after the tour - thanks to all of you!

An extra special advantage we had traveling with IPPS President Terry Hatch was his running commentary about the native plants and exotics that grow profusely in New Zealand. Having Terry's knowledge and willingness to share so much information with the group added a wonderful dimension to the visual input.

The tour started in Queenstown on the South Island, a major center for outdoor adventurers, used most often in the winter ski season. To help the northern hemisphere visitors become acclimated to the fact that this was the start of fall in New Zealand, with cool days and colder nights, everyone in the tour group received a weather resistant jacked (complete with the IPPS symbol on the backs – making it easy for us to find one another in a crowd!), a warm ski cap, a brimmed cap for those bright, sunny days, and a bagful of goodies from local supporters.

Our first night started on top of the mountain above the town with a skyline gondola trip and dinner among the stars. This was a good impression for many exciting adventures to come.

While in Queenstown, a cruise on the historic steam-powered TSS Earnslaw gave us a fantastic view of Lake Wakatipu and the surrounding scenery. Then an adrenaline rush was in store as the group took the Shotover Jet ride -- a fast and thrilling trip amid the rock walls and boulders of the Shotover River. New Zealand's South Island has a number of fiords and the Doubtful Sound Wilderness Cruise gave us a look at the unique landscape and plants. A group of bottle-nosed dolphins welcomed us, too.

Another unique treat in the South Island was a trip to the Franz Josef Glacier for an overnight stay at a hotel next to this still receding remnant of the Ice Age. On the way, the group visited a unique "lifestyle nursery" owned by Jamie Urquart producing a surprisingly large collection of specimen plants. After a drive through the scenic west coast of the South Island, with small towns whose existence came from gold mining, the group visited a local brewery in Greymouth that people in other countries are just recognizing for its quality beer varieties – Monteith's! Our tour guides to help us appreciate the beauty and history of this rugged area of the country were Mark Brown (Brownie) and Steve Newall (Jandals) and their commentary added tremendously to our enjoyment.

One of the best ways to comfortably appreciate the changing landscape on the South Island is to take the TranzAlpine train from Greymouth to Christchurch and the group enjoyed this four-hour experience. Near Christchurch, while the International Board met informally, others on the tour visited the Fern Factor, owned and operated by Paul Micheal, a uniquely specialized nursery, as well as Murray Manall's Southern Woods Nursery with production and retail operations aimed mainly at the rural, lifestyle market.

One of the awesome stops of the entire tour was a visit to Ken and Bev Loader's Gethsemone Gardens, complete with a full size Noah's Ark used for weddings and other affairs. The Biblical influence of the gardens and the unaffected faith and horticultural knowledge of the owners was amazing to see – the words of the Lord's Prayer spelled out on the grounds in *Buxus* was a sight probably not replicated anywhere else in the world.

Christchurch is home to a large, well-designed and well-maintained Botanic Garden, living up to its reputation as the "Garden City of New Zealand," and we could have easily spent most of a day on these grounds. But our treat for the day was from New Zealand Alternate Director Ray Lawson who hosted the group on a visit to one of the retail centers for which he oversees production for Oderings Nursery – with a barbeque and a delightfully social evening.

Leaving Christchurch, the excitement continued with a visit to Geoff Elliot's wholesale nursery, with lots of ideas generated from his innovative approaches to plant production. Then up the coast to Kaikoura and a whale-watching escapade that left some of our tour group a little green around the gills! But how amazing to see these marvelous creatures at close range and protected – along with sea lions habituating the rocks along the shoreline. Dinner that evening at Montana's winery in the Brancott Vineyards was exquisite.

Traveling from the South to the North Island is no small feat – no bridge connects the two, so planes and boats are the primary transportation. IPPS joined many passengers on the Bluebridge Ferry to Wellington, capital of the country, on the North Island. A visit to Te

Papa, the museum that preserves the Maori culture, helped visitors understand how this country was settled and modified from its pristine state after volcanoes formed the islands. Wellington's Botanical Gardens covers a hillside high above the city, and the cable car ride to the top was almost as exhilarating as the wide variety of plants in the garden itself. Then the group followed the Wellington Harbour shoreline toward the Tasman Sea, staying two nights beside the sea at Raumati.

Our local hosts for this segment of the tour, Gus and Glenys Evans, hosted the non-Board group for a visit to the Lindale Tourist Complex while the Board held a morning meeting. Then everyone enjoyed a visit to see an outstanding collection of vintage automobiles and other forms of transportation at the Southward Car Museum. A visit to Gus Evans Nursery showed the group what a small but comprehensive nursery can effectively produce, and Geoff Jewel provided an excellent overview of his nursery with diverse plants, but a specialization in Protacea plants. His wife's exceptional floral wholesale business, providing these dramatic cut flowers to the florist market, was an added feature.

As the group left the Kapiti Coast, a stop at Manakau Village Nursery with hosts Goeff and Sue Stent gave the tour group a chance to see a nursery specializing in liners for wholesale nurseries. Then on to Starter Plants in Palmerston North, where Eddie and Jan Welsh showcased their open ground nursery and fed the group a fabulous lunch prepared by Eddie and Jan and their superb staff. That day ended in a chateau near the volcanic mountains of Tongariro National Park.

In the National Park, Philip Smith, a former ranger with the Department of Conservation, took the more adventuresome of the group on an alpine walk, and then to his nursery, Taupo Native Plant Nursery, Ltd., a wholesale/retail nursery specializing in large projects involving mass native plantings.

Unique to New Zealand is the thermal village in the Rotorua area, where hot bubbling mud pools and geysers are everyday occurrences. The group's time there allowed immersion into the Maori culture with a welcome ceremony, evening meal and indigenous entertainment in a recreated Maori village – a fantastic look at this unusual culture that forms the basis for many of the country's native customs yet today.

Leaving Rotorua, the tour group headed for the final destination and conference location, Auckland. On the way, our tour guide Dave Ogilvy took us through an area renowned for the black tree fern. Peter and Carol Frazer showed the group their Growing Spectrum Nursery, not only a well-organized and productive nursery but also the site for an outstanding training course for young nursery professionals. We also visited Bruntwood Nurseries, owned by Dave and Shirley Ogilvy, and well known for its production of *Phormium* cultivars, shipped around the world.

Our last tour stop was especially rewarding as International President Terry Hatch, his wife Pam, and son Lindsey showcased their fascinating nursery and plant collections at Joy Plants. *Clivia* are a specialty item for Terry, and it was clear to everyone that Terry represents one of the real horticultural gurus of our time. Dinner that evening at the nursery, organized by the Hatch family and staff, was an appropriate prelude to our last night on the bus for the final ride to Auckland.

While the International Board held its final meeting the following day, others in the group joined conference attendees for a pre-tour of the Tiri Matangi nature reserve. The tour's finale was an outstanding dinner high above the city of Auckland in the Sky City Orbit Restaurant.
