## **IPPS Australian Region 50<sup>th</sup> Meeting Celebration,**

### **Leura NSW 2nd to 6th May**

After the recent years of disruption through Covid 19 with closure of borders and rolling lockdowns, as well as fires and floods, members of the Australian region of IPPS were finally able to meet and celebrate in May at the top ranked Fairmont Leura Resort in the Blue Mountains near Sydney. Leura was the site of the region's first meeting in 1973, so the theme of **"Looking Back, Looking Forward"** was very meaningful.



We tried to reinforce this theme with our pre-conference tour of local attractions including gardens designed by the Blue Mountains nurseryman Paul Sorrensen, Scenic World and more. On Tuesday May3 we visited Mayfield Gardens at Oberon, a modern 65 ha high altitude garden where we were shown around by the nursery team. This was unanimously a highlight of our tour. On the way back to our conference venue we enjoyed visiting some more Blue Mountains historic and scenic sites.

During the previous two years since the last International conference at Twin Waters in 2019 most of the society's meetings were either held limited local site face to face or Zoom meetings, so like many societies around the globe we been embracing technology and adapting our online presence through social media and our website as well as YouTube videos. We have learnt through this and intend keeping those positive innovations. All this through what has been a very busy time for nurseries supplying Australians spending more time gardening.

Planning for a full scale conference in 2021 during lockdown and state border closures (while the population was being vaccinated) in hindsight was brave. The Fairmont Resort at Leura was chosen not only for its excellent facilities and location but also the ability to cater for nearly any possible requirements of social distancing.



Many thanks must go to our sponsors also who made this event possible; especially Garden City Plastics who have taken up sponsorship of our 6 Pack Youth award, Norwood, Hort Journal, Hort Innovation, Transplant Systems, Skybury Farms, Proptec, Croft Structures and others.

The speaker programme also was dramatically changed in format to allow for 19 talks on the day, and poster papers (as well as Q&A and ask the expert sessions). Because of the brevity of the talks speakers were asked to get to the main point of their presentation and avoid lengthy introductions. This would appear to be a trend now among many conferences and has resulted unexpectedly in many presenters also wanting to contribute a fuller article for the society's "Proceedings" online journal. Many delegates later said that this was the best conference they had ever attended.

The speaker programme explored the foundation of not only the society's history but trends and fashions for plants, health benefits of growing plants, the potential for breeding as well as for endemic plant species, and of course a solid section on irrigation, media, greenhouse construction experience during a pandemic and water management and biosecurity. It has been a long time also since we had a poster paper display. The editorial committee had a hard time late that afternoon choosing the best paper for the Anita Boucher Hort Journal Award with such a high standard of talks.

The Awards dinner on the Thursday night was very special. Not only was the food and entertainment great, but we shared in acknowledging the contribution of many members and others to horticulture, as well as recognising our 2022 GCP 6 Pack and new members. Of special note was the awarding to Peter Waugh by the International Board of the International Award of Honor, pre-

sented by John Messina. Peter has been a long term member of IPPS regions, serving the Japan region on the International Board for many years.

We also thanked Tony Vander Staay for his leadership as President over the past four years, and recognised honorary life membership in their absence for; Edward Bunker, Ian Tolley and John Teulon (who each attended the inaugural meeting 50 years ago). Reflections from Ian Tolley and Edward Bunker on the history of the society were read by Clive Larkman and John Bunker respectively.

Cameron Blakemore from GCP won our annual golf trophy this year. Daniel Austin received the Steve Vallance award from David Hancock on behalf of Natallie for his







contribution to horticulture, especially recognising regular contributions of articles on behalf of IPPS to the Hort Journal.



Gabe Mostafa the Publisher of Hort Journal received the Edward and Mary Bunker Award for his contribution to Horticulture across Australia.

It was the excellent paper “Horticultural Biosecurity Tips – HACCP Points often overlooked in Horticultural Biosecurity Programs” delivered by Michael Pritchard from Alltech Lienert Aust that led to him receiving the Anita Boucher Hort Journal Award for 2022.



Then our Rod Tallis awardee for the best research paper submitted was presented to Bongani Ndawana for “Acclimatisation and grow on requirements for Papaya, Avocado, Passionfruit and Pineapple”. As well as his dance moves shown to us on the night, he has since become a local hero in far north Queensland since receiving this award.



Clive conducted our auction, and the range of items was impressive. Thank you everyone for supporting this with items and for funds raised to support future youth programmes. We were indeed fortunate to have Phil Davidson (a top musician and songwriter) provide back-

Our Friday site visits started with **Oasis Horticulture** at Yellow Rock, whose staff took us around the site of this large potted colour producer. Points to note were the way they manage their despatch area and conversion of site vehicles to electric. David Jacobs, their CEO gave us a brief talk on the organisational structure of Oasis Horticulture, their sites and history of ownership and range of products. Dr Andrew Berneutz also gave a brief introduction to some of the products **Bonza Botanicals** have bred at their section of this site.



For lunch we travelled to **The Secret Garden and Nursery** in the grounds of Western Sydney University Richmond campus. The Secret Garden is a not-for-profit 'Community Hub' garden and retail nursery focussed on horticultural therapy, and occupies 6 ha.

We then travelled to Australia's highest cool climate **Blue Mountains Botanic Garden** occupying 28 ha (with an additional 128 ha for conservation, at 1000 metres above sea level) at Mount Tomah. This garden is located in a UNESCO world heritage area and was previously a nursery that has been developed into one of the botanic gardens of the Sydney Royal Botanic Garden and Domain Trust. Tour groups were shown around the site that has many rare collections.



Finally we ended with a relaxed farewell dinner at the Leura Golf Club adjacent to the resort. As well as being a welcome break, the 2022 conference gave us all the opportunity to network with other passionate plants people and catch up in person finally.

I would also at this time like to thank and acknowledge the contribution other members of the organising committee for 2022; Heather Higgs, John Messina and Tony Ferraro. Of course Pam Berryman provided invaluable on-going organisational assistance and our board members also provided immense assistance, especially with gaining sponsorship support.

We did have some feedback that some would have preferred more visits to production nurseries. As most will appreciate we have had several floods this year with resultant road closures and significant impact on a number of sites. The region had been declared a natural disaster zone. Then there is the impact of Covid and travelling times to other potential sites that meant we needed to resort to plan B rather than split to separate coaches and destinations.

So now hopefully we can all look forward to more regional meetings and our conference in Geelong at the end of May next year, and opportunities for international travel and exchange.

## Anita Boucher Award

At each of our conferences for some time papers that have been presented have been assessed and ranked by the Editorial team and Hort Journal for the quality of the presentation, the material presented and potential impact to horticulture. The IPPS Anita Boucher Award has been sponsored by Hort Journal each year in memory of Anita.

Perhaps not so surprising this year with biosecurity threats and having endured the impacts of a Covid 19

Pandemic the group selected the paper presented by **Michael Pritchard** – “Horticultural Biosecurity Tips – HACCP Points often overlooked in Horticultural Biosecurity Programs”. Well that makes it look straightforward, but there were many papers within a point so this was a very close decision.

Michael is the Biosecurity Business Manager for Alltech Lienert in Australia. Michael has provided biosecurity plans, training, chemical handling, safety and application training to the animal, aquatic and horticultural industry.

Plant growers these days have quite detailed plans for their site biosecurity. “Off the shelf plans” often overlook site specific problems that can result in poor seedling performance or even worse a pathogen infection that’s killing tubestock and plants, and your reputation. The presentation provided a few tips from experience of where to look and what to do to remedy these biosecurity system failures.
